What do you care about? What stirs your heart enough to act? What can't you help keeping silent about?


All those are part of advocacy—speaking up for someone who is unable to. All parents are advocates for their children at one time or another and some people have experienced being an advocate for a relative who is ill and temporarily cannot speak for themselves. Have you ever thought of advocacy as a witness to Christ? Because what you are doing is caring for your neighbor. Do you remember the bracelets that said WWJD (what would Jesus do)? The answer is that Jesus would care about the hungry, the homeless, the stranger, the children and orphans and widows.

ELCA advocacy is a wide-ranging effort, touching on local concerns as well as national and world-wide. Sometimes advocacy is dramatic and very public, as in rallies and demonstrations. But more often it's quiet and slow, involving months or even years of work with governments and social agencies. It is not political as it does not identify with a particular ideology or party. Here is a partial list of topics that ELCA Advocacy focuses on: migrant children; corporate social responsibility; faith, science, and technology; justice for women; peace not walls; racial justice; social issues. 

ADVENT I, NOVEMBER 27

O Lord, how shall I meet you,

"O Lord, how shall I meet you?" is certainly an appropriate question. Advent has begun. Christmas is around the corner. Typical holiday pressures seem slight, though, in comparison to what German hymn writer Paul Gerhardt must have faced.

Four of Gerhardt's five children died early in life. His wife died when the remaining child was only six years old. The political situation in Germany caused problems for Gerhardt, who was also a pastor. Yet, how positively Gerhardt answers his own question, "O Lord, how shall I meet you?"

Sometimes hearing about the problems of others on put our own situations in a proper perspective. Anticipating our future with Christ always can lighten our load. As we move toward that little town of Bethlehem, the promise of eternal life brings joy, hope, and peace.

Rejoice, then, you sad-hearted, Who sit in deepest gloom, Who mourn your joys departed And tremble at your doom.

Despair not; he is near you,
There, standing at the door,
Who best can help and cheer you
And bids you weep no more. Amen.






MISSION PROJECT
